Loose Ends – September FASTCAT 2023



Directions for handling scent work odors at YABTC

No odors should be placed on any agility, obedience, or other training equipment. This could cause an accident for our dogs that practice/compete in these other

sports.

No kitchen items may be used in any search areas.

In order to have as clean of an environment as possible the following procedures should be followed:

If you use a solid surface item in a search area:

- 1. Always use a scent vessel. No naked Q-tips should be used.
- 2. After you remove the vessel, spray the item with the Zero Odor spray. Dry with a paper towel. Then place a small piece of painters' tape and mark the date on the tape. This will help with contamination of other chairs on the rack or other items in the space/room.
- 3. Upstairs you will find a plastic container with a lid marked Scent work "HOT" items. If you use something other than a cardboard box, spray with the Zero Odor spray, mark with the tape and place in the plastic container. Place any cold items back on the shelf upstairs.
- 4. Hot cardboard boxes can be placed in the trash.
- 5. If a hide is placed on the wall, make sure to stay inside our training area on the office side of the building. Do not place any odor tins on the wall out in the agility/obedience area.

It is very important to keep our hot and cold items separate! For the success of our scent trials, it is very important to maintain a clean environment.

Treating, Resolving, and Preventing Diarrhea

From 1500-1700, British kings had a servant who was called the Groom of the Stool. The job included keeping the "Close Stool" (a sort of indoor outhouse) clean, recording and observing the King's "leavings," and even wiping the King's behind. We dog owners serve as the groom of the stool for our dogs (stool instead of Stool). Just like the Royal Groom, we keep the potty area clean, wipe off poop that sticks to far, and worry when our dog king's and queen's poop looks odd. Most worrisome is when our dogs get diarrhen.

Diarrhea (in veterinary terms) is an increase in frequency, fluidity, or volume of feces. With increased volume or frequency but not change in form, the most common cause is the dog are or overate something such as a dog that breaks into the bin of kibble and eats its fill or a medium dog that are six apples or all the skin off a cooked tarkey. If constipation or frequent bowel movements don't resolve within a day or two, a call to your vet is in order. If accompanied by belly pain, pacing, depression, not eating, or not drinking, call your veterinarian or take the dog to an emergency veterinary hospital. While constipation or the frequent need to poop are concerning, these issues are often less worrisome than mushy to puddle diarrhea.

Changes in consistency of stool and how concerned you should be run the gamut from "dogs eat everything and get diarrhea easily" to "run to the vet emergency clinic, do not pass go, go now." Causes of diarrhea can be streas, a change in diet, food intolerances, bacterial and viral infections, intestinal parasites, partial bowel blockages, and eating things they shouldn't. Calling the vet or trying a home remedy doesn't just depend on the cause, but also on any other signs the dog is showing. A call to the vet is needed if the dog also has fever, weakness, vomiting, dehydration, belly pain, restlessness, whining, and even "just ain't doing right" (you know your dog—if they seem off, call your vet.) If your dog has other chronic health conditions, call your veterinatian to see if a little diarrhea is or ise't worrisome.

When contacting your veterinarian, be prepared to describe the consistency, color and frequency of bowel movements. The "How's It Looking" chart charts can be found at (areau,purina, co.nklarticlas/doga/bealtb/digenicos/guide-to-dog-poop can help you describe the stool's appearance. Some people call the "Pile" or "Soggy Pile" cow pie consistency. Note if the stool has mucus or blood in it. Of course, also describe any other signs, like the dog's temperature (normal is 99.5-102.5 F) and hydration. To check hydration, pinch up a fold of skin over the dog's shoulders and liet it go—in a well hydrated dog the "tent" flattens to normal within about one second. If you're not sure, use your hydration as a comparison by pinching up the skin on the back of your hand, let go, and see if it remains to flar faster than your dog's did. If so, your dog is dehydrated. A bit more sensitive than the skin fold test is feeling your dog's gums to see if they are moist, tacky, or dry. Again, you can compare the dog's gums to the werness of your own. Tacky or dry gums mean the dog is dehydrated and a visit ASAP to a veterinary hospital is needed. Remember, if you are debating whether to call the vet or nor call your veterinarian. Signs that mean "go diractly to the vontrinary emergency hospital" include:

- Liquid, frequent, bloody diarrhea (causes could include gastroenteritis, intussusception where the bowel folds into itself, poisoning)
- Belly pain in a constignated dog or in a dog with soggy pile to puddle of poo diarrhea (causes include pancreatitis, gastroenteritis, or a bowel blockage)
- High fever (infection, pancreatitis, peritonitis)
- Dog is "flat out," doesn't want to move, not drinking

If your dog requires a veterinary exam, tests will be run to determine the cause and severity of the dog's gastroenteritis (inflamed gastrointestinal tract). This will likely include a fecal exam for parasites, blood work to look for infection, gastrointestinal (GI) x-rays, and a. GI ultrasound. Dogs with an empty gut (gas only) may need to be hospitalized, taking nothing by mouth, on IV fluids, pain medicine for colic, and rest. I've had cases where the dog spent 12 hours in the veterinary hospital and others that needed four days of hospitalization. Treatment, of course, depends on the cause. For example, corn cob intestinal blockage usually requires surgery; parvovirus infection requires hospitalization on IV fluids; severe hookworm infestation can require de-worming and a blood transfusion.

If your dog is acting normally, not having bloody liquid poo, " drinking and well hydrated, you may be able to correct the problem at home. Encourage your dog to drink and try some home remedy diets for doggy diarrhea. To encourage drinking (unflavored Pedialyte or water), add beef broth, vegetable broth, water from a can of water packed tuna, or applesance to the water. Add the least amount of extra flavor that works—no stronger than 3/4 cup of water to 1/4 cup of additive. A caution on applesance: keep the amount small and only use for 2-3 days as it can also cause diarrhea. Sometimes warming up the liquid mix makes it more appealing to the dog's nose. If the dog won't

drink or vomits after drinking, offer crushed ice or ice cubes in a bowl so the dog can take a small sip. Rice water is also good as it hydrates and helps stop diarrhea. To make rice water, boil white rice (not minute/fast cook rice) in extra water (a lot of water). When the rice is cooked, strain out the rice grains, saving the broth. Offer your dog the cooled, white starchy broth. You can add a splash of beef broth or meat baby food to make it more appealing.

Once your dog is drinking and holding it down, try adding one of the home cooked bland diets for diarrhea. Feed small amounts 4-6 times a day. Bland GI diets help calm gut inflammation and also prevent development of food intolerance to the ingredients in the normal diet. Feed the bland diet for 4-5 days until your dog's poo is at least soft formed. Then, gradually switch to the dog's normal food (e.g. 3/4 cup bland diet, 1/4 cup normal food for two days, then 1/2 and 1/2 for two days, etc.). If the home cooked bland diet doesn't resolve the diarrhea within 2-3 days, or if the diarrhea resolves but then comes right back, a veterinary exam to determine the cause is needed. Home cooked bland diets for diarrhea include:

- Cooked white rice (not fast cook or minute rice) mixed 2/3 rice to 1/3 low-fat cottage cheese
- Cooked white rice mixed 2/3 rice to 1/3 boiled hamburger (boiling removes the fat)
- Cooked white rice mixed 2/3 rice to 1/3 boiled ground turkey or chicken
- Cooked white rice mixed 2/3 rice to 1/3 cooked salmon (e.g. water packed canned salmon)
- Boiled white potatoes without the skin mashed plain and mixed 2/3 potato mash to 1/3 boiled hamburger, ground turkey or chicken, salmon or low-fat cottage cheese
- To the above rice or potato options, you can add canned pumpkin (100% pumpkin, not pumpkin pie filling). For each cup of cooked GI diet, add 1/4–1/3 cup pumpkin.

After a dog had a GI upset, especially gastroenteritis, you need to rebuild/reset the GI bacteria (gut microbiome) and allow the stomach and intestines to heal. Microbiome bacteria help with normal digestion and health of the gut lining. Healing of the gut lining (regrowing the inner layer of cells, etc.) can take a month or longer. To restart the gut microbiome, add probiotics to the dog's food. For mild diarrhea cases, adding probiotics for one week may be enough. For severe cases, probiotics added daily for life will not only reset the gut, but may also prevent recurrent

gastroenteritis. My 2-year-old grand-dog Aussie recently had severe, bloody gastroenteritis. Because we determined he has a sensitive gut, he's now on a prebiotic, probiotic, digestive enzyme food additive for life. Sources of probiotics to help rebuild the gut include:

- Prescription probiotics from your veterinarian (often powder or gel)
- Plain yogurt (Greek or French style) with active cultures: add 1 tablespoon to the food once a day. Do not use low-calorie or sugar-free yogurt since it may contain xylitol (which is toxic to dogs) as a sweetener.
- Kefir: add about 1 tablespoon once a day to food
- Gel probiotics for livestock (calves, lambs), available at livestock supply stores, follow the label directions
- Powdered probiotics available online from sites such as Chewy, Petmed, Amazon

Preventing future episodes of diarrbea also requires some sleuthing. Why did the dog have diarrhea?

- Stress from packing and moving gave your dog diarrhea? Next time, send your dog to a familiar family member or friend during the packing and move.
- Eating garbage caused the diarrhea? Put garbage behind a closed door, always take corn cobs and cooked chicken bones right to the outside garbage can.
- Changed dog food suddenly? Always change gradually when introducing a new food, increasing the mix of new and decreasing the old food over 4-5 days.
- Food intolerance? Your veterinarian may recommend a specially formulated or limited ingredient or sensitive stomach diet for the rest of the dog's life (poultry free, salmon and sweet potato dog food, etc.)

While specialty diets and lifelong probiotics/prebiotics may be expensive, maintaining your dog's gut health vs. future vet bills for GI issues probably balance the cost out.

The Royal Groom of the Stool watched consistency, color, and frequency of the King's poop. We grooms of our dog's stool are also charged with maintaining our dog's gut health by feeding quality food and eliminating the causes of gastroenteritis (lock up garbage, throw out torn toys that might be eaten, reduce stress, add probiotics, etc.). Who knew we dog owners were following Royal Servants duties, while adding a few of our own footsteps?
